Post 76 Legionnaires Attend Tuskegee Airmen Convention

American Legion Post 76 members George Curcio, Marvin Morgenthal, Joel Forman, and Steve Daugherty attended the 44th Annual Convention of the Tuskegee Airmen at

the Rampart Casino Hotel (as visitors) on 19 August 2015. In their Legion uniforms with shirts and caps, the Post 76 members had a good rapport with the Airmen as many of them are Legionnaires as well.

Post 76 members were extremely fortunate to meet some of the original Airmen who flew many combat missions in WWII and some who later flew missions in



the Korean and Viet Nam conflicts. The Legionnaires had an opportunity to thank the Airmen personally for their heroic service to our country, in spite of their having to endure the flagrant racism and bigotry of a segregated military at that time.

One Airmen at the Convention was Norman Artis, who, having been born a little later than the others, was one of the last to graduate from flight training at Tuskegee Airfield. He missed World War II but did see action as a fighter pilot in Korea and Vietnam. Another was Colonel Charles McGee, who will be 96 years young in December, although he appeared years younger. He holds the all-time record for combat missions, covering three wars, of all American fighter pilots in U.S. history! Yet, he was so humble--a true gem of a man.

It was awe-inspiring for the Legionnaires to be in the presence of these Airmen--men are true American heroes and a part of American history. It was a sincere honor to meet them. They all were very gracious to the Legionnaire visitors, and it was a true joy to be in their presence. *Marv Morgenthal, Trustee*

With a load of young male high school students from La Vegas, and many surrounding areas headed for Reno and the campus of UNR. Little did I understand that in a matter of just a few days, those young students would change their attitude, their thinking, their mannerism's and even in some cases, their posture would make a dramatic change that will last a lifetime. I had heard the stories but now I was going to see for myself if they were accurate.


This was my first experience with the Boys' State week long program. I am happy to report, this was not my last trip. I cannot relate to you how amazing these kids truly are. They are intelligent, hard working, eager, and in every case I saw, respectful of the other delegates, their councilors, and to myself and my fellow Legionnaires. They were not only interested in the work they were doing for their respective cities, and soon to be elected positions, but they wanted to know, "what did you do in the service, where were you in the service, what did you learn, etc." The other thing they always said was "Thank you for your service" and they truly meant it, and a plus, they called us "Sir or Mr.". I was privileged to have meals with many of them and even when they were not performing their assigned duties, they were talking about how they were going to do things and invent programs for the positive effects on their cities and their state. Thinking, always thinking.

The comradeship these young people made in just a matter of hours and their ability to continue to function and adapt under stressful and in a very fatigued condition by the end of the week, convinced me that perhaps, our great country is going to be alright. We hear so many negative reports about our young people and usually we do not hear about the positive things and accomplishments that so many of them have made. I cannot tell you how many I spoke with that were, National Honor Society, President Student Council, JROTC members, Captain of various sports teams, musical awards, scholastic awards of many kinds, and the list could go on and on.

Was I impressed? No!! I was in awe. I have a new hope for the future and a much better understanding of the capabilities of our young men. If these are examples of what the next generation of our leaders will be, we should be just fine. The learning experience these delegates gained and the possibilities the have in their lives because of that learning not only was an inspiration to them but also to me. Many of them have applied to become councilors themselves in upcoming sessions. It left that "Oh Yeah" I'd do it again feeling with them.

I must recognize the Councilors from Boys State. They did an outstanding job and I was proud to be a part of the team. They knew how to handle different problems and adapt to changes very quickly so it seemed the program functioned without any pause or disruption in the daily events. A well deserved GREAT JOB and a huge THANK YOU for all you are doing.





As your new chairman of the Boys' State program for our Post, I feel it is necessary to ask you for your help to further this program. I have not been so impressed by a group of young men in almost 45 years. This year we are planning to sponsor 10 young men again. The cost for our Post is \$260.00 for each candidate. We have almost 400 paid members in our Post. Any and all donations are gratefully appreciated. If we can just donate the cost of a soda or cup of coffee, I think it is little to pay for an investment in our country's future leaders.

I would like to tell you more about this experience but instead I invite you to get involved and attend this Legion Program. Our young people deserve it and we can help to further it by your personal involvement and financial backing. I'll be happy to talk with any and all of you about this most appreciated experience.

Fiscal Year End 2015

June 30, 2015 signaled the end of the 2nd quarter for 2015, but for Post 76 it signaled the end of our Fiscal Year and it was a great year to be a member of our Post. Although I have been a member for only 3 years, from my understanding it is one of the best financial years for our post. Although I went over these numbers in our last General Meeting I thought it was important to relay to the members at large how we fared. Dues collected \$13,112. We donated \$6,918 to 11 different organizations with the largest dollar amount of \$2,750 gong to Nevada Boys State. We received \$2,085 in donations from various activities the Post has been actively doing like Flag Posting from conventions. In addition we received \$254 donated to our new program Battle Buddies which helps members who are unable to pay their yearly dues. The Raffle program generated \$610 back to the post and of the \$610 that went to the winners, 90% or \$549, was donated back to the Post. \$1,357 was donated to Nevada Boys State as our Post sent 9 Boys to the enriching program held every year in Reno. All of these numbers are higher than they were in 2014 and 2013. Our Post had over 500 members pay their dues which enabled us to donate to Veterans groups and Youth programs which is exactly the purpose of the Legion. Every member should be extremely proud of what we accomplished financially in 2015, looking forward to an even better 2016. As always if I can be of any assistance, please let me know.

Nevada Veterans Advocates

Post 76 now has 2 members who have achieved status as Certified Veterans Advocates. **Bobi Oates**, 18-year Legionnaire and USAF Veteran, and Larry Eisenberg, 8-year Legionnaire, and USAF Veteran both recently completed a rigorous training course to attain the Certified Nevada Veterans Advocate ranking. The training covers 20 areas of detailed information required to assist Veterans in navigating through and applying for the myriad benefits available to veterans through the Veterans Administration and Nevada State. The training covers topics such as VA Compensation, Nevada Legal and Financial Assistance, CHAMPVET, VA Death Benefits, Employment Programs, "Green Zone" Training, Advocacy and Support Terms, and much more. The Veterans Advocate is a volunteer position, and the Advocate assists Service Officers associated with the Nevada Department of Veterans Services. New Memorial in Las Vegas to Honor America's Veterans

The Las Vegas Veterans Memorial Foundation is sponsoring the design and future construction of a world-class national memorial to recognize and honor the sacrifices of all American veterans and their families. <u>The Las Vegas Memorial—A National Tribute</u>, featuring 18 larger-than-life statues, will span over 200 years of our nation's history and bridge one generation of veterans to the next--from the Revolutionary War to today's Global War on Terror. The statues, 18 in total and standing over 7 feet tall, will collectively contribute to the dual themes of the memorial's design. The memorial will be located at the Grant Sawyer State Building, just north of downtown Las Vegas, at 555 E Washington Street. Construction is scheduled to start about November 2015 and be completed by about June 2016. Thinking about membership renewal? Efforts to reach out to all Post 76 members to renew their membership for 2016 are now in full swing. At this point, Post 76 is well over 70% of the Post 76 goal for Paid Members for the 2016 dues year, and we thank all those members who have renewed early in the season. We encourage **each and every member** to renew their membership while it's fresh in the minds, so there'll be no chance of having a membership expire due to the notion getting lost.

The American Legion recently passed a resolution at its National Convention recently to increase dues for **all** American Legion members by \$5, beginning 16 January 2016. This is the first national per-capita dues increase for nearly a decade. Your Post 76 Executive Board, however, voted not to increase member dues until the beginning of the 2017 dues year— 1 July 2016. Don't let your dues renewal go that far! Also, if you are thinking about applying for a Paid-Up-For-Life (PUFL) member, it might be advantageous to do it **now**, before HQ changes its PUFL calculator because of its dues increase.


There is always an unavoidable time delay from when you renew your membership online or by mail and when you actually get your renewal logged at Headquarters; so you may receive another dues invoice, even though you know you've paid. All Legionnaires who have renewed their membership receive a Welcome Letter from the Post 76 Commander with their <u>2016 Member ID Card</u>. This is your receipt for payment of dues, and you know you can ignore any subsequent dues invoices from HQ.

The first of these exciting updates – starting for enrollments after 1/1/2015, anyone enrolled in LegionCare will be covered for as long as they remain a member of The Legion Family. No need to re-enroll every 5 years!

The second change, and what we think is the most important - All "Legion Family" members – Legion, senior ALA, and senior SAL – in good standing are now eligible for the coverage. The Legionnaire Insurance Trust has been working hard to provide valuable benefits to your entire family and we look forward to continuing to serve veterans' insurance needs.

Those "Legion Family" members stopping by our booth were able to enroll in the LIT's LegionCare program and have their coverage become effective immediately, but this opportunity is not restricted to just those who were at the National Convention. Every eligible "Legion Family" member may enroll, but the member must sign-up to be covered. Please keep the momentum going after the convention and spread the word about these exciting changes to LegionCare.

Reminder about LegionCare:

What is LegionCare? LegionCare provides up to \$1,000 of 24 hours accidental death coverage to an enrolled member. And if an enrolled members suffers a covered loss while performing "official Legion Family business", there is an additional \$4,000 benefit --bringing the total to up to \$5,000.

How do I enroll? Just go online to <u>www.TheLIT.com/No-Cost-LegionCare</u> and fill in the requested information. By enrolling on-line, your coverage will begin immediately and you will get an e-mail confirmation within minutes. Those without access to the internet may enroll by calling the LIT's toll-free number – (800) 235-6943 – and our customer service area will process your enrollment over the phone.
