NATIONAL CONVENTION IN RENO, NV

Being immediate past Post 76 Commander and immediate Past District 2 Commander, and current Department 1st Vice Commander, certainly allows me to see where we were, where we are, and a look to see where we are going. their Convention registration. No one got past PDC Jack Ford and his lovely wife, Gloria. The rest of the Post 76 volunteers, made sure that all the other Departments got their credentials for the convention, either loaded onto their vehicle or delivered by one of our guys. There were over 600 cases that they lifted and lifted up again. They made sure that all the Legionnaires, Auxiliary and even some SAL squadrons got their materials. The Color Guard was also recognized for its Color Guard participation in the Summerlin Patriotic Parade, where it won 1st Place in the military-related entries, as well as 1st Place in the People's Choice voting. Captain of the Guard, Walter Cheatham seems to be getting us all in step.

POST 76 AWARDED COVETED "ATTAINMENT OF 100% MEMBERSHIP GOAL

For the second year in a row, Post 76 has attained over 100% of the membership goal set by the Department. In fact, at the end of the year, we attained 118% of the goal!. This achievement was due to the exceptionally diligent work of many of the officers. They either contacted current members to remind them how much their membership means to supporting the local community; contacted members in the general Nevada unassigned Post, and convinced them to transfer to our Post for the same reason; or most importantly, recruited new members to replace those that have moved out of state to new Posts or transferred to Post Everlasting.



YVETTE WEIGOLD ELECTED DEPARTMENT OF NEVADA COMMANDER

Yvette Weigold was elected the Nevada Department Commander on July. 16, 2017, in Ely, Nevada, during the 99th Department convention of America's largest veteran's organization

Weigold joined the United States Marine Corps in 1981. She graduated from Parris Island boot camp in 1982. Weigold served as a 0431 Embarkation Specialist at Camp LeJeune, NC from 1983 to 1986. She then transferred to the United States Army and served as an Artillery Repairer (45L) at Aberdeen Proving Grounds, Maryland. In 1987 Weigold deployed to Friedberg, Germany and served with the 54th Combat Support Battalion (FWD) until 1990. After transferring to the Army Reserve in 1991 Weigold served as a 73C Finance Specialist and served in the 384th MP Battalion, Ft Wayne, Indiana. She then transferred to the 257th Transportation Company in Las Vegas, NV. Weigold picked up an additional MOS as 74D (NBC) after attending NBC school at Ft Leonard Wood, MO and the Field Management of Chemical and Biological Casualties (FCBC) course at Edgewood, Maryland. Weigold was called to active duty in 2003 to support



Operation Enduring Freedom. She served an additional 3 years on active duty with the 63D Reserve Support Command out of Los Alamitos, CA. Weigold retired from the Army in 2007 as a Sergeant First Class.

Weigold joined the American Legion in 2007 just after retirement. She served as Commander of Post 149 and Vice Commander of District 2. She is a current member of Post 51 in North Las Vegas and a Paid Up for Life Legion member of 10 years. Weigold graduated from the American Legion College in Indianapolis, IN in October 2012. She has served as the Department Sergeant at Arms, 2nd Vice Commander and 1st Vice Commander in the years since. She has been a member of the National Security Committee since 2014.

Weigold attended the Marine Corps NCO School in 1983, Army Basic Non Commissioned Officer's Course in 1991 and the Advanced Noncommissioned Officer's Course in 1993. She is also a graduate of American Military University and holds an Associate's degree in General Studies as well as a Bachelor's in Sports and Health Sciences. Weigold is pursuing her Master's in Nutrition with Liberty University.

FIRST EVER WOMAN DENISE ROHAN ELECTED NATIONAL COMMANDER

Denise Rohan was elected national commander of the 2 million-member American Legion on Aug. 24, 2017, in Reno, Nev., during the 99th national convention of America's largest veteran's organization. Rohan of Verona, Wis., joined



the U.S. Army in 1974 and has served The American Legion since 1984. Prior to her transfer to Post 385 in Verona, she served as the commander of Post 333 in Sun Prairie, Wis., where she established a Sons of the American Legion squadron and chartered a Boy Scout troop. She has also served as the department commander of Wisconsin.

Rohan and her husband, Mike, are both 2006 graduates of the National American Legion College and 2015 graduates of the Wisconsin American Legion College. Both have gone on to serve as department and national American Legion College facilitators.

Rohan was employed with the University of Wisconsin Madison as the assistant bursar of student loans until her retirement in 2012. She managed the University of Wisconsin Madison, University of Wisconsin Green Bay and University of Wisconsin Colleges \$120 million loan portfolio made up of approximately 200 different federal, institutional and state programs in compliance with all laws, regulations and policy. She was responsible for the efficiency and design of the computerized student loan accounts receivable system.

After almost two years, this memorial has been installed at the location we have fought for so hard. The dedication itself is scheduled for Tuesday, October 17, 2017 at 1000 hours (10:00).. VETERANS' DISEASES ASSOCIATED WITH AGENT ORANGE

Agent Orange was a tactical herbicide used by the U.S. military from 1962 to 1975, named for the orange band around the storage barrel. The military sprayed millions of gallons of Agent Orange and other tactical herbicides on trees and vegetation during the Vietnam War. Veterans who may have been exposed to Agent Orange include Veterans who were in Vietnam, the Korean Demilitarized Zone, on Thai Air Force bases, and who flew on or worked on C-123 Aircraft. Several decades later, concerns about the health effects from these chemicals, including dioxin, a byproduct of Agent Orange production, continue.

VA assumes that certain diseases can be related to a Veteran's qualifying military service. We call these "presumptive diseases."

VA has recognized certain cancers and other health problems as presumptive diseases associated with exposure to Agent Orange or other herbicides during military service. Veterans and their survivors may be eligible for benefits for these diseases.

•AL Amyloidosis

A rare disease caused when an abnormal protein, amyloid, enters tissues or organs

- •Chronic B-cell Leukemias
- A type of cancer which affects white blood cells
- •Chloracne (or similar acneform disease)

A skin condition that occurs soon after exposure to chemicals and looks like common forms acne seen in teenagers. Under VA's rating regulations, it must be at least 10 percent disabling within one year of exposure to herbicides.

• Diabetes Mellitus Type 2

A disease characterized by high blood sugar levels resulting from the body's inability to respond properly to the hormone insulin

Hodgkin's Disease

A malignant lymphoma (cancer) characterized by progressive enlargement of the lymph nodes, liver, and spleen, and by progressive anemia

Ischemic Heart Disease

A disease characterized by a reduced supply of blood to the heart, that leads to chest pain

- Multiple Myeloma
- A cancer of plasma cells, a type of white blood cell in bone marrow
- •Non-Hodgkin's Lymphoma
- A group of cancers that affect the lymph glands and other lymphatic tissue
- Parkinson's Disease
- A progressive disorder of the nervous system that affects muscle movement
- •Peripheral Neuropathy, Early-Onset

A nervous system condition that causes numbness, tingling, and motor weakness. Under VA's rating regulations, it must be at least 10 percent disabling within one year of herbicide exposure.

•Porphyria Cutanea Tarda

A disorder characterized by liver dysfunction and by thinning and blistering of the skin in sun-exposed areas. Under VA's rating regulations, it must be at least 10 percent disabling within one year of exposure to herbicides.

- Prostate Cancer
- Cancer of the prostate; one of the most common cancers among men
- •Respiratory Cancers (includes lung cancer)
- Cancers of the lung, larynx, trachea, and bronchus
- •Soft Tissue Sarcomas (other than osteosarcoma, chondrosarcoma, Kaposi's sarcoma, or mesothelioma)

A group of different types of cancers in body tissues such as muscle, fat, blood and lymph vessels, and connective tissues
