The Sock It 2 me (Which Director Jack Ford organized with donations




from several members) was done in December at the V.A. Hospital. Finance Officer Dennis Christiansen, Judge Advocate Willie

Due to the pandemic lockdowns, Post 76 has been restricted to holding all executive board and general

Elections were held. AGENT BLUE

Agent Blue is part of the Rainbow Herbicides Group. It was used from 1961 to 1971, mainly in Vietnam and later in Laos.

Agent Blue affects plants by causing them to dry out. As rice is highly dependent on water to live, using Agent Blue on these paddies can destroy an entire field and leave it unsuitable for further planting. Agent Blue has no half-life, it last forever in soil, sediments, rivers, canals, and public water supplies. Once it's in environment, its toxicity is magnified as it moves up the food chain; slowly killing and disabling humans as it accumulates in the body.

Blue was used during "Operation Ranch Hand", and was used in Laos to kill crops in order to deprive



communist Viet Cong and North Vietnamese troops of food.

The Vietnamese Rice today remains tainted with arsenic. By attacking the food supply, reasoning went, villagers would be forced out and the villages would no longer provide support and protection for the Viet Cong.

Kenneth Olson, professor emeritus of soil science at the University of Illinois and a US Army Vietnam – era veteran, has studied and published on the soils and sediments of South Vietnam, the roles they played in Vietnam warfare and the legacies left behind. Olson's recently released paper, "The fate of Agent Blue, the Arsenic Based Herbicide Used in South Vietnam during the Vietnam War," is coauthored with Larry Cihacek, also a US Army veteran, who is professor of soil science at the North Dakota State University. It's their most recent in a series of papers on Vietnam Soils and sediments and herbicide persistence in the environment.

"Agent Blue was sprayed on 100,000 hectares (one hectare is about 2.5 acres) of mangrove forests and about 300,000 hectares of rice paddies just prior to rice harvest time that resulted in destroying the standing crop and contaminated soils and water sediments with arsenic.

The "Rainbow Herbicides." Were sprayed on wetlands, rice paddies, forests, mangroves, bamboo groves and military base perimeter fences to defoliate jungle vegetation, reveal guerrilla hiding places and destroy the food supply of enemy troops.

Cihacek, a soil chemist stated, "Agent Blue was the most effective of all the rainbow herbicides in killing rice and grasses and persisted in the soil after the crops were destroyed."

It was manufactured by the Ansul Company chemical plants in Marinette, Wisconsin, and Menominee, Michigan. During Vietnam, oceangoing ships were loaded with 205-liter Agent Blue barrels and shipped via the Saint Lawrence Seaway to the coast of South Vietnam. Arsenic is a naturally occurring element found throughout Southeast Asia deltas, including the Mekong Delta. Today, arsenic-contaminated rice and groundwater are growing concerns as neither naturally occurring arsenic nor anthropic arsenic has a half-life and neither can be destroyed. Arsenic that's in place due to human intervention has remained in the Mekong Delta environment for the last **50 plus years** and has added to persistent arsenic contamination in water supplies, sediments and soils. Water-soluble arsenic primarily leaches into the soil root zone and the groundwater or is carried by floodwater into adjacent waterways or volatilized under anaerobic rice paddy conditions as arsine gas.

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The health of 15 million Vietnamese people living in the Mekong Delta is at risk from the combination of manufactured and natural arsenic in drinking water and food supplies. The arsenic in contaminated rice paddy soil, sediment and water is taken up by fish or shrimp, or by crop vegetation; trace amounts can end up in the rice grain and food crops bioaccumulation of arsenic in fish, shrimp and birds increases the concentration of arsenic throughout the food chain, leading to a bio magnification of its toxicity in the Vietnamese people.

It's urgent that elevated arsenic concentrations in water supplies and agricultural products be identified and mitigated through better runoff control and groundwater managements; improved rice genetics and alternate crop selections; shifts in crop management associated with tillage, fertilization and phosphorus use; and systematic monitoring of food and drinking water. In 2001, the US Agency for Toxic Substances and Disease registry ranked arsenic as number 1 on its list of hazardous substances at Superfund sites – polluted areas needing cleanup of hazardous contaminants

In 2016 Olson took a trip to South Vietnam to study the Chu Chi and Iron Triangle soil tunnels in an attempt to determine why those tunnels were so resilient and stable, so hard to destroy with bombs during the Vietnam War. The answer was in the nature and properties of the soils. When the soil tunnels were aerated and dried, the soil wall took on properties similar to concrete and no additional wooden external support beams were needed to hold up the ceilings.

In 2019, there was a follow-up trip. "Long-term Fate of Agent Orange and Dioxin TCDD Contaminated Soils and Sediments in Vietnam Hotspots," examined the persistence of dioxin in South Vietnam soils, sediments, water and the food supplies. Many Veterans were interested in this report and contacted the researchers for further information. As a result of the vast interest, an unofficial Band of Retirees (mostly Vietnam, Vietnam-era veterans and university agriculture professors) were brought together to discuss, fact-check and collaborate on research and writing projects, especially this most recent paper on Agent Blue.

The Merry band of Retirees mission is an educational mission, code-named "Operation Divine Providence." The committee members share personal experiences and scientific information among themselves and with others to educate Vietnam and United States governments, militaries, veterans and civilians about the environmental impacts of the spraying of Rainbow herbicides more than 50 years ago during the Vietnam War.

The group members were also an important source for ground trothing, checking facts, research, writing, review and distribution of the Agent Blue article. They view their work as an "educational and historic gift to the Vietnamese" from US Vietnam veterans and Vietnam-era soldiers.

We were told that these agents had no medical impact on humans, and we weren't in Laos and Cambodia; therefore, we can't apply for benefits. These denials have been going on and still exist today. It's really earth shattering the United States uses us at their expense, then lies to you, and refuses to grant your entitlements. Instead of taking care of what they created, the US turns their heads away from their responsibilities to their soldiers and promises they made. How can you continue to trust such a system? So, the reality is that the US continues to deny that we were in two countries during that time (Laos and Cambodia), but I can tell you that CIA operations existed from Laos. Nixon ordered a conflict in Laos, and without reservations I will attest that our soldiers were in those countries. To prove it, we can line up hundreds of Vets that can tell you so. So, with my final word, I ask all of you this question: WHY WOULD THERE BE A NEED TO SPRAY LAOS AND CAMBODIA IF WE WERE NOT THERE? WHAT WAS THE PURPOSE IF NOT FOR OUR SAFETY NEEDS?
