# Commander's Message

At the March General meeting, our keynote speaker was *Ken Gossett*. He recalled his experiences on a Liberty Ship in 1947 on a trip around the world taking 9 months and 4 days. Part of that trip included going to Lae, Rabaul and Port Morseby in Papua New Guinea. Unlike my fellow sailors, I did extensive work with the people and the exploration of the territories with the help of an Australian man serving Vacuum Oil Company there. My mates spent all of their time complaining about the heat and lack of any activity except drinking into stupors. I saw the remains of the 216,000 Japanese, Australian and American military killed there and the U.S. Navy base taken over by the jungles. I was a Merchant Marine for over 5 years and then served as First Sergeant in the U.S. Army with a company of up to 1200 men.

**William "Richard" Barrett** PFC [B-BTG 420 AFA; CCB; WWII Veteran] recently entered Post Everlasting February 3, 2013. This story was told on the 10th Armored Division Western Veterans Chapter website. I was born in Northeastern Iowa. Our family moved to a farm in Kansas before I started school. We lived on a small farm. I grew up and attended school in Solomon, Kansas.

I answered the draft and was inducted on the 23rd of September, 1943. My first assignment was with the 16th Armored Division. I was there until spring of 1944. At that time, a large group of the 16th trainees were shipped to the 10th. We finished basic training there and in September, we were headed overseas. On Sept. 23, 1944, we landed in Cherbourg, France. There we picked up our tanks (M-7), a 105 MM Howitzer that was mounted on a medium tank chassis. I remained in the same gun crew for the remaining time. The driver and I stayed on the same weapon.

Then it was an armored column across France to where we seen action around Metz. I was living in the field and it was muddy. On Dec. 15th, we received orders to move out the next morning. We had no idea where to, but we did know we were heading North.

On the afternoon of the 17th, we moved through Bastogne and set up in firing position just north and east of Bastogne. There was no snow on the ground that day. We spent the night on the ground and woke up the next morning with 7" of snow on us. From that position, we never fired a shot. Then we had to move back through town to another site and got shelled going through. The fog was heavy so our observer could not see targets.

On the 19th, we were shooting in all four directions, including the road we came in on. The enemy had surrounded us. We tightened up and we started running low on ammunition. I zeroed my sights several times but never fired at a direct target. The orders came through, that if you saw our tanks, to shoot between them as the enemy was behind them. We held our positions as best we could. That afternoon the 101st Airborne came in on trucks. I had a personal weapon, but never fired it. I went to bed many nights counting how many bullets I had for my carbine, but that old 50 caliber was mine to take care of, and I was not going to use that carbine if I had that 50 caliber, because that could turn tanks around. I was never wounded, however Colonel Brown, Commander of the 420th at the time, was hit by a shell that went over my head and hit the colonel, and eventually killed him. Major Crittenberger took over for him.

We were there until the middle of January until we moved down South and east to the vicinity of Metz. We continued in that direction to the border of Austria. My next move was to be a replacement and head home for 30 days. On my way home, they dropped the big bomb, so my orders changed. About 3 months as a prison guard in Ft. Hood, Texas, and then I was discharged on Feb. 1, 1946. Moreover, that ended my military career.

# Show Your Pride in Serving and Get the Recognition from a Grateful Nation

The coming months will also present the opportunity for veterans to stand and be seen in several memorial activities and parades. If you are able — join us. The community is looking to show its support for what you have done and need you there for them to be able to show it. You are able to stand, side by side with your fellow Post 76 members and show the pride you have in your service to your country. The Memorial Day ceremony at the Lakes South Park is again being sponsored by the Post. Please be there to honor our fallen. Post 76 is again entering the Summerlin Patriotic Parade on Thursday July 4, 2013. This is the only 4th of July parade in Las Vegas. We have a number of slots still available to ride in the Model Ts provided by the Las Vegas Model T club. Later in the year, we participate in the Veteran's Day Parade in downtown Las Vegas, November 11th, 2013 10:00 AM. More information will be provided to those that notify us they want to attend either or both parades.

One of our big activities this spring was the school award program. Your neighborhood schools select the students that best represent Americanism in their class. Post officers and Legionnaires went to school award ceremonies and represented all veterans in the presentation of the American Legion award to these deserving students. Four of our high schools have Jr. ROTC programs.

In those programs we awarded four bronze medals for Military Excellence. This award is presented annually to one third or fourth year cadet based on the cadets' general military excellence. Each cadet must: rank in the top 25% of their JROTC class; and demonstrate outstanding qualities in military leadership, discipline, character, and citizenship. We also award four bronze medals for Scholastic Excellence. This award is presented annually to a third or fourth year cadet based on the cadets' overall scholastic achievements. Each cadet must: rank in the top 10% of the high school class; rank in the top 25% of their JROTC class; demonstrate leadership qualities; actively participate in related student activities such as student organizations, constructive activities or sports.

Two additional high schools and thirteen middle schools selected one young woman and one young man each to be recognized by the American Legion School Award. Medals were awarded on a six-point criterion of Character, Courage, Scholarship, Leadership, Community Service and Patriotism. It is the intent of the American Legion to recognize and encourage these attributes in our youth to cultivate good citizenship.

In all, Post 76 recognized and presented medals and certificates of achievement to 38 young patriots. These individuals represent our future and we are proud to recognize them as they continue on to be our future leaders.

# Membership is our Post's most important asset!

Our Post has a total of 540 members. 493 members reside here in Nevada, 9 in California, 3 in Arizona, Tennessee and Missouri, 2 each in Colorado, Florida, Oklahoma, South Carolina, Texas and Utah. The rest live in 17 other states across our great country. We have 243 Vietnam War veterans, 124 from the Korean War, 103 WW II, 27 Lebanon/ Grenada, 23 Persian Gulf, and 12 Panama. Your fellow Legionnaires from our post has 195 members from the Army, 134 members from the Air Force, 127 members from the Navy, 43 are from the Marines, 7 from the Coast Guard, and 3 from the Merchant Marines. Most of our members live in area code 89134, 89130 is 2nd and 89129 is 3rd. We have 1 member with 53 continuous years in the American Legion, 1 with 62 years, 1 with 63 years and one member with 68 years!

Less than 8% of our members have not paid their dues as of April 30, 2013. Look at your membership card. If it does not say 2013, you are now delinquent. There can be many reasons for this.
